Our total expenses during 2022 exceeded our income by over \$8,000. Our church is affected by the same inflation that affects all of us. Fuel oil costs, for example, were more than twice as much as the previous year. The following table shows income vs. expenses over the past three calendar years.

We continue to be blessed by the leadership of the Reverend Frederick (Rick) Neu in worship, Bible study, at council and congregational meetings and in most other facets of our ministry. RESOLUTION PROPOSING PEACE FOR A WEARY WORLD

WHEREAS, the tragic history of the world can be told with reference to the seizure of one nation or peoples' land by another nation or people; and

WHEREAS, the cost of those seizures over the centuries, in terms of both human loss and economic damage, is both immense and impossible to measure accurately; and

WHEREAS, Article 2 (4) of the United Nations Charter provides that "All Members shall refrain in their international relations from the threat or use of force against the territorial integrity or political independence of any state..." and

WHEREAS, aggressive action to compel the involuntary transfer of land from one nation to another continues to this day, as witness the actions of Russia against Ukraine; and

WHEREAS, an honest history of the establishment of national boundaries as they exist today will reveal that injustices were done, irrational boundaries were created, and involuntary transfers of land were imposed by one group upon another; and

WHEREAS, despite the imperfections in past actions that created national boundaries, it would be impossible to unscramble those imperfections at the present time without creating further injury of huge proportions; and

WHEREAS, (1) for that reason, it is appropriate to freeze all national boundaries as they now exist, and (2) as to the involuntary transfer of one nation's land to another nation, it is time to say "No more!" and

WHEREAS, it is right and just for the Church of Jesus Christ to lead in the call for peace;

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE NEW ENGLAND SYNOD OF THE EVANGELICAL LUTHERAN CHURCH IN AMERICA THAT:

(1) We recognize all national boundaries as they now exist as permanent, notwithstanding our recognition of many imperfections in the process of creating those boundaries; and

(2) We condemn all actions by any nation to effect the involuntary transfer of the land of another nation, and we say "No more!"; and

(3) Similarly, we call on the nations of the world to honor and enforce the provisions of Article 2(4) of the United Nations Charter, to condemn all actions to seize lands of another, and to declare such actions to be a war crime; and

(4) We memorialize the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America, in Churchwide Assembly, to adopt a Resolution substantially identical to this Resolution, to advocate for its adoption by the Lutheran World Federation, the National and World Council of Churches, and the Congress of the United States of America.
